What do Guidance Counsellors do?

Guidance Counsellors are professionally trained to undertake the following task within the school guidance programme.

• Personal Counselling

Individual, group or class work to promote interpersonal communication skills, decision making, self-awareness and the ability to plan

• Career Guidance

Late Application Closing Date 1 May 2021 at 5:15pm (€60 online fee)





Online Applicant Checklist

For applicants who must send supporting documents as part of their application: I have read the Qualifications and Assessments section that is relevant to me (pages 5-8) and page 12 of the CAO handbook which provides instructions for submitting supporting documents to CAO.	
I intend to get a Certificate of Posting when I post the envelope containing my supporting documents to CAO.	
After the Normal Application Closing Date	
I have received my Statement of Application Record (posted to all applicants before the end of May).	
I have notified CAO of any errors or omissions contained in my Statement of Application Record within 7 days of receiving the Statement.	
I have submitted my changes, if any, to CAO via the Change of Mind facility before 1^{st} July at $5:15\text{pm}$.	
I have taken note of any restrictions to the introduction of courses after the 1 st February deadline.	
The Offer Rounds	
I have checked my email account and the 'My Application' facility to find out if I have received an offer.	
I have received my Offer Notice OR another Statement of Application Record and checked for any errors or omissions contained in either document.	
If accepting an offer: I have accepted my offer online via the 'My Application' facility by the reply date OR I have returned the Offer Acceptance by post to reach CAO by the reply date. I have not accepted both.	
If no offer was received: I have checked the second Statement of Application Record to make sure that the details held on file for me by CAO are correct and I have notified CAO immediately of any errors or omissions contained in the Statement of Application Record.	

Please Note: This document may be used as a reference tool throughout the CAO application process, however, it does not replace the CAO handbook.

The CAO handbook must be read carefully by all applicants before making an application through CAO.

Introduction

Welcome to *The CAO:* A guide for parents and guardians. This document has been prepared by the Central Applications Office (CAO) to assist parents and guardians supporting a student in their undergraduate application to Irish Higher Education Institutions (HEIs).

The CAO is responsible for processing applications and recording acceptances for HEIs, but all decisions on admissions are made by the individual institutions and not by CAO.

The information provided in this guide is tailored for parents and should not be used by students. Students must carefully read the CAO Handbook, distributed to their school in September, which contains information on all of the courses, restrictions, deadlines, fees and application guidelines. All students should also seek the advice of their school guidance counsellor before completing their CAO application.



Your role as a parent/guardian














Throughout this guide, we use the terms 'parent', 'guardian', and 'child', but please note that this document has been prepared for a parent, step-parent, guardian, carer or supporter of someone applying to CAO.

Helping your child to choose their higher education courses

It is extremely important that your child takes the time to review all of the courses and Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) available to them. Courses are listed in the CAO Handbook and can also be searched using the 'Courses' facility at www.cao.ie.

Students should request a prospectus or visit the website of the institution that they are interested in attending. When deciding on courses, your child must make sure to check the minimum entry requirements for each of the courses and take note of any restrictions, such as early application dates, supplementary information that may need to be submitted, or if an interview forms part of the qualification process; such courses are referred to in the handbook as restricted courses and late application or an application on Change of Mind may not be available options.

When helping your child to decide what courses they want to apply for, you should also take some time to consider the financial implications of their decision; consider the cost of accommodation, food, and travel expenses for every year of study.







Helpful Tips

If you know of any family members or friends who are attending the institution that your child is interested in applying to, or who have completed the courses that they are interested in studying, then you should arrange to meet with them to discuss the course and institution in greater detail. Attendance at Open Days and Education Fairs can also be helpful.

Completing the application form

The majority of students now complete the application form online. Students who submit a form online may avoid some of the many common pitfalls experienced by those who submit a paper application form, for example entering an invalid course code.



Applicants should place their courses choices in genuine order of preference, and not based on predictions about what the points score will be or how they will perform in their examinations.

Personal details

Your child should take care when entering their personal details, for example their date of birth and email address. They must also inform CAO of the examinations that they will be taking or that they have completed in the past. If we do not have this information in advance your child cannot be credited for it at the offers stage. CAO must also be notified of any exemptions, for example exemption from Irish or a third language.

Ample time should be allowed for the completion of the application form. Occasionally, browsers will time-out and information may be lost; CAO has no control over this. Deadlines are strict, so applicants should avoid leaving an application to the last minute.

Where supporting documents are required please number, date and write the CAO application number on the front of each page, and refer to the CAO Handbook for more information. Applicants applying for the **DARE and/or HEAR schemes** should allow time for the completion of the online forms and gathering the necessary supporting documentation in advance of the deadline. CAO application number

When your child submits an online CAO application they will receive an e-mail containing details of their registration, an e-mail verification code, and their CAO application number. This number is extremely important as it will be used by your child for all interaction with CAO throughout the year.

My Application facility

This is where your child will log in to their CAO account once they have registered on the CAO system. They will need their CAO application number, their date of birth, and the account password that they created at the registration stage.

Choosing courses

There are two course choices lists – the Level 8 and Level 7/6 lists. Applicants can enter 10 course choices on both lists. The two lists are independent of each other - the only time the applicant must choose between them is at the offers stage if they receive an offer off both lists in the same round.

Important correspondence from CAO

CAO communicates with applicants via e-mail, text and post at different stages throughout the year. All correspondence from CAO should be treated as extremely important and checked carefully to make sure that the information held on file by CAO is correct. **Please ensure that your child checks their e-mail account regularly.**

Application number email (immediately after applying online)

When your child applies online their first correspondence with CAO will be in the form of an automated e-mail which will contain your child's application number, an e-mail verification code and the application details that they have provided.

Email correspondence

CAO will communicate with applicants via email at various intervals throughout the application process. All CAO correspondence must be read carefully and any errors or omissions notified to CAO immediately via the Contact form on our website www.cao.ie.

It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that all relevant correspondence is received and dealt with appropriately. Please make sure to regularly check the email account provided at the application stage.

Statement of Application Record (end of May)

Before the end of May, all applicants (online and paper) will receive a Statement of Application Record. This is an extremely important communication, instructing applicants to carefully review and verify their account information. Any errors or omissions (e.g. an incorrect or missing examination number) must be communicated to CAO immediately via the Correspondence Section of their CAO Account.

If your child has not received the Statement of Application Record by the end of May you must contact CAO via www.cao.ie and we will issue a duplicate copy.

Offer Notification/Statement of Application Record (mid-August or earlier for some applicants)

At the offers stage, your child will either receive notification of an offer, or a Statement of Application Record (by e-mail). If they receive a Statement of Application Record this is because they have not been deemed eligible for an offer in this round. You must ensure that your child checks that all of the information that CAO currently holds on file is correct, including their examination details. If your child receives an offer notification this means that they have been deemed entitled to a place on one of their Level 8 or Level 7/6 courses, or both.

Please check that the information contained in the Offer Notification is correct, and inform CAO of any incorrect or omitted information in your child's CAO Account. A further explanation of the offers stage is provided later in this document.

Making changes to a CAO application

There are a number of deadlines which must be noted when your child is making amendments to their CAO application. Changes to some personal information cannot be carried out online and your child will have to post the amendment with their CAO application number to CAO, Tower House, Eglinton Street, Galway (please obtain and keep a certificate of postage).

Amendment deadline

It is important to note that there are restrictions on introducing courses using the Change of Mind facility - page 3 of the CAO Handbook outlines these restrictions.

To make changes to course choices

(during the periods outlined above):

 Log in via the 'My Application' facility and go to add/change course choices



- Introduce all courses on the 'new list' in the preferred order of preference, remembering to click 'Continue with course changes' to save the information
- Check the acknowledgement e-mail sent to the e-mail address supplied when making the application. Make sure to check that the changes have been recorded completely and correctly.


Communicating with CAO

If you wish to make general enquiries with CAO on behalf of your child you must have their application number, full name and date of birth.

CAO staff members will only be able to discuss details of your child's account once you can verify knowledge of that information, for example, if you wish to discuss course choices you will be asked to verify the courses that are listed on your child's application. The same applies for examination details and results. If you do not have any of this information CAO cannot communicate any information about your child's application to you.

The best method of communication for you or your child is via the CAO website www.cao.ie.

Using the online 'Contact' facility and quoting the application number will allow CAO time to review your child's file and revert with an answer to the query, in writing, within one working day. You can also call CAO on **091 509800**, but please note that due to the large number of applicants each year our phone lines are extremely busy.

Are you eligible?

You should use our Eligibility Reckoner on the SUSI website (www.susi.ie) to give you an idea if you meet the criteria to receive Student Grant funding.

To be eligible for a grant you must qualify under the following criteria:

Nationality and Residency:

- You must be an Irish, EU, EEA or Swiss National or have specific leave to remain in the State; and
- You must be ordinarily resident in Ireland the EU, EEA or Switzerland for 3 of the last 5 years. If you were resident outside the Irish State, it may affect the type of funding you could receive.

Course:

- You must be progressing in your education (increasing your NFQ level); and
- You must be attending an approved course in an approved institution.

Income:

- Your reckonable income (income calculated for grant purposes) must fall under the specified thresholds. This income will be a factor in determining what type of funding you could receive; and
- Applications are assessed with regard to gross household income from the previous year.

Class of Applicant

Knowing what class of applicant you are is very important in deciding if you may be eligible for a grant, if or how you should apply and whose income is taken into account when assessing your application for funding. Students' Applicant Class falls into two categories:

- · Dependent; and
- Independent.

As a Dependent Student you may fall into either one of two categories:

Dependent

If you are under 23 years of age on January 1st of the year of your first point of entry into further or higher education you are automatically classed as a dependent student and you are assessed based on your parent's/ legal guardian's income and your own income; OR

Mature Dependent

Over 23 years of age on January 1st of the year of your first point of entry into further or higher education and still residing with your parents/ legal guardians.

As an Independent Student you must be:

- 23 years of age or over on January 1st of the year when you first enter/re-enter further or higher education; and
- You must have been living independently from your parents/legal guardians from the October in the year prior to your first point of entry/re-entry into further or higher education and you will be required to provide evidence of this.

1. Make your application

You must have an online account with SUSI before you can make your grant application. For information on how to create an account, please go to www.susi.ie.

Fill in and submit your online application.

Please ensure that you provide complete and accurate information (dates of birth, PPS numbers and bank details in particular) as failure to do this will delay processing of your application. Please note that you must apply to SUSI each year to renew your application.

2. Supply supporting documentation

Based on the information supplied in your online application form you will receive either a refusal letter or a letter requesting the supporting documents required to further process your application.

3. Receive grant decision

You will be advised of your grant decision. Your application may be:

Awarded

An award letter is issued to you offering you a grant and highlighting the further steps you need to take before your grant can be paid; or

Refused

A refusal letter is issued to you. This letter will also highlight the further steps you may take if you wish to request a review of your grant decision. These steps are also outlined in the SUSI Reviewing your Grant or Appealing your Grant processes available on www.susi.ie

4. Receive your payment

Maintenance grants are paid directly into your bank account and fee grants (or student contribution) are paid directly to your college.

To ensure payment of your grant, you must have:

- Provided your bank details to SUSI (maintenance grants only) this can be done at any time through your online grant application account;
- Had your course details confirmed by the CAO to SUSI or submitted your Final Course Acceptance (FCA) form on-line to SUSI; and
- Been confirmed to SUSI by your college as registered and attending your course.

HEAR / DARE

Applications

The Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) is a college and university admissions scheme which offers places at reduced points to school leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds

The **Disability Access Route to Education (DARE)** is a college and university admissions scheme which offers places on a reduced points basis to school leavers with disabilities

DARE Application Timeline

Introduction to DARE

What is DARE?

DARE is a third level alternative admissions scheme for school-leavers whose disabilities have had a negative impact on their second level education.

DARE offers reduced points places to school leavers who, as a result of having a disability, have experienced additional educational challenges in second level education.

Who can apply to DARE?

DARE is for school leavers under the age of 23 as of 1 January 2021 with a disability, who have been educationally impacted as a result of that disability. Applicants to DARE can present with an Irish Leaving Certificate, A-Levels and/or other EU qualifications.

What types of disabilities does DARE consider?

- Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD)/ Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)
- Autistic Spectrum Disorder (including Asperger's Syndrome)
- Blind/ Vision Impaired
- Deaf/ Hard of Hearing
- Developmental Co-ordination Disorder (DCD) Dyspraxia
- Mental Health Condition
- Neurological Condition (including Brain Injury and Epilepsy)
- Physical Disability
- Significant Ongoing Illness
- Speech and Language Communication Disorder
- Specific Learning Difficulty (including Dyslexia and Dyscalculia)

Prioritisation of Eligible DARE Applicants with a Physical or Sensory Disability

Research has identified that students with physical and sensory (blind/ vision impaired or deaf/ hard of hearing) disabilities are particularly underrepresented in higher education in Ireland relative to all students with disabilities. In order to increase the numbers of DARE students with physical and sensory disabilities being admitted to higher education, the DARE colleges have agreed to prioritise these two groups when allocating reduced points places.

Important Information

Mature applicants and applicants applying on the basis of Further Education and Training (FET) results have different admission routes. You can get further information on these routes from college and university websites.

What are the benefits of making a DARE application?

If you apply to DARE and meet the application criteria (that is, are deemed eligible for DARE) you may be offered a place even if you do not have enough Leaving Certificate points for your preferred course. Each participating college and university has a reserved number of places to offer eligible DARE applicants at lower Leaving Certificate points.

How do Reduced Points Work?

An example of a reduced points offer would be where the Leaving Certificate points for a particular course is 366 points. An eligible DARE applicant could be offered a place with a lower points score, e.g. 356 points. This applicant would also, like all other applicants applying to college, need to meet the minimum entry requirements and any specific programme requirements before being considered for a DARE reduced points offer. The reduction in points for DARE places can vary every year. The amount of points a particular course is reduced by is dependent on a number of factors, such as:

- The overall number of places on the course,
- The number of reserved DARE places on the course,
- The number of DARE eligible applicants competing for these reserved places.

Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)

HEAR is a third level alternative admissions scheme which offers places on reduced points and extra college support to school leavers who are resident in the Republic of Ireland and are under represented at Higher Education due to their socio-economic circumstances. You should apply to both HEAR and DARE if they are relevant to you. For more information see **www.accesscollege.ie**.

Can I apply to DARE and HEAR?

If I am eligible for both DARE & HEAR:

Research has shown that students with disabilities from disadvantaged backgrounds face the greatest obstacles when it comes to progression to higher education. In order to increase the numbers of students in higher education, facing this 'double disadvantage', colleges participating in DARE and HEAR have agreed to prioritise this group when allocating reduced points places.

Is DARE for me?

To be eligible for DARE you must meet both the DARE Educational Impact criteria and DARE Evidence of Disability criteria.



Meeting DARE's Educational Impact criteria

Has your disability/ condition impacted you in a combination of the following indicators:

- 1. Have you received intervention or supports in post-primary school?
- 2. Has it impacted on your attendance or regularly disrupted your school day?
- 3. Has it affected your school experience and wellbeing?
- 4. Has it impacted on your learning or exam results?
- 5. Has it caused any other educational impact?
- 6. Required for applicants with a Specific Learning Difficulty: is it severely impacting on your literacy or numeracy skills?

Applicants with a Specific Learning Difficulty must meet Indicator 6 plus one other indicator.

All other applicants must meet any combination of two indicators from Indicators 1 to 5.

Please see pages 12-15 of this handbook to view what documentation you are required to submit.

Meeting DARE's Evidence of Disability Criteria

DARE has specific requirements for the evidence of disability documentation for each type of disability or condition. Please see pages 16-19 of this handbook to view what documentation you are required to submit.

Essential DARE Application Information

How do I apply to DARE?

To apply to DARE you must agree to the DARE Terms and Conditions (see page 23). Applicants applying to DARE must:

- 1. Be under the age of 23 as of 1 January 2021.
- 2. Apply to the CAO by 17:15 on **1 February 2021**.
- 3. No later than 17:15 on 1 March 2021, disclose your disability and/ or specific learning difficulty in your CAO application and fully and correctly complete Section A of the Supplementary Information Form (SIF). To apply to DARE, you must answer YES to Question 1 ('Do you wish to be considered for DARE?') on Section A of the fully completed SIF by 17:15 on 1 March 2021.
- 4. Download Section B Educational Impact Statement (EIS) and have your school complete the form. Return the EIS to CAO to arrive by **17:15 on 15 March 2021**.
- 5. Download Section C Evidence of Disability, and have it completed by the appropriate medical professional (only if you do not already have a report verifying your disability which meets the DARE criteria). Return it to CAO to arrive by 17:15 on 15 March 2021.
- 6. Applicants with a specific learning difficulty are asked to provide a full psychological assessment of any age completed by an appropriately qualified psychologist instead of the Section C Evidence of Disability form. This report must be accompanied by attainment scores from tests administered by your school and/ or an appropriately qualified psychologist.

Important Instructions

- Get assistance from your parents/ guardians and use this handbook to help you complete your DARE application.
- Send Section B Educational Impact Statement and Section C Evidence of Disability documents to the CAO, Tower House, Eglinton Street, Galway by 15 March 2021.

*Important note for applicants with specific learning difficulties.

In addition to a Psychological Assessment Report of any age completed by a psychologist which clearly states a diagnosis of a specific learning difficulty (dyslexia/ dyscalculia), applicants with a specific learning difficulty MUST also have two literacy or two numeracy attainment scores at or below the 10th percentile (Standard Score of 81 or below) from testing carried out on or after **1 February 2019**.

These attainment scores can be from one (or a combination) of the following sources:

- 1) Scores from school-based attainment testing.
- 2) Scores from attainment tests carried out by a psychologist.

Attainment testing must have been carried out on or after 1 February 2019 and all applicants must submit an EIS completed by their school.

- Applicants with an SLD, submit a full psychological assessment report of any age AND attainment scores dated after 1 February 2019.

By 1 March 2021 at 17:15. Complete Online Supplementary Information Form

- Answer YES to Question 1 "Do you want to be considered for the Disability Access Route to Education" on the Supplementary Information Form (SIF) by 17:15 on 1 March 2021.
- If you are applying to carry your DARE eligibility forward from 2020 to 2021, provide your 2020 CAO application number under Q1 (b) (see page 9) and click Apply.
- Save and submit your application.

By 15 March 2021 at 17:15 post your supporting documents to CAO.

- Please number each page and write your CAO application number, name and the date on the front of all documents submitted to CAO.
- Keep the originals of all documents and proof of postage.
- DARE will not contact you about missing, incomplete or incorrect documentation, so please ensure that you have supplied all documents requested by 15 March 2021 at 17:15. Please contact a DARE advisor if you have any questions in advance of submitting your documentation.

What is the Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)?

The Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) is a college and university scheme which offers places on reduced points and extra college support to school leavers, resident in the Republic of Ireland, who are under represented at Higher Education due to their socio-economic background.

HEAR has been set up by a number of colleges and universities as evidence shows that longterm poverty can have a negative effect on how well a student does at school and whether they go on to college.

HEAR applicants must meet a range of financial, social and cultural indicators to be considered for a reduced points place and extra college support.

What are the benefits of filling in a HEAR Application?

Reduced Points Places: Each participating college has a reserved number of places to offer eligible HEAR students at lower Leaving Certificate points.

Extra College Support: If you get a place through HEAR you will receive a variety of academic, personal and social supports while at college.

Examples of extra college supports may include:

- An Orientation Programme to introduce you to college life.
- Extra tuition if required, study skills and exam preparation.
- One to one meetings with student advisors.
- Social gatherings/mentoring.
- Extra financial assistance when available/advice regarding grants and scholarships.

What HEAR is not

HEAR is not your maintenance grant. The maintenance grant is the main source of financial assistance available from the Irish State for students in full-time Post Leaving Certificate Courses (PLCs) and full-time higher education undergraduate courses.

HEAR is an admissions scheme to help students who may not traditionally go on to third level. Students applying to HEAR are encouraged to find out more information on the maintenance grant by logging on to **susi.ie**. Additional information on financial assistance for third level students is available at **www.studentfinance.ie**.

Who can apply to HEAR?

HEAR is for school leavers under the age of 23 as of 1 January 2021 who are resident in the Republic of Ireland. HEAR applicants must meet a range of financial, social and cultural indicators to be considered for a reduced points place and extra college support.





How do I fill in a HEAR application?

Applicants applying for HEAR must:

- 1. Be under the age of 23 as of 1 January 2021.
- 2. Apply online to CAO by 17:15 on 1 February 2021. CAO applications open on 5 November 2020 at 12 noon.
- 3. No later than 17:15 on 1 March 2021, indicate in your CAO application that you wish to apply for the HEAR scheme and fully and correctly complete all elements of the online HEAR application form. Once you have completed the HEAR application form you will get a checklist which tells you which documents you need to supply.
- 4. Post your supporting documents to arrive in CAO no later than 17:15 on 15 March 2021.

To complete your online HEAR Application you must:

Get assistance from your parent(s)/guardian(s).

Use the **HEAR 2021 Handbook** to help you answer all relevant questions on your online HEAR application.


Should I apply

HEAR applicants must meet a range of financial, social and cultural indicators (criteria) to be considered for a reduced points place and extra college support. Here is a list of all the HEAR indicators:

- 1. **Income:** Your family income falls on or below the HEAR Income Limit for the year 2019.
- 2. **Medical / GP Visit Card:** Your family has a Medical Card / GP Visit Card that was in date on 31 December 2020.
- 3. **Means Tested Social Welfare:** Your family received a means-tested payment from the Department of Social Protection for at least 26 weeks in 2019.
- 4. **Socio-economic Group:** You belong to a group that is under-represented in higher education based on the occupation and employment status of your parent(s) or guardian(s). The under-represented groups are the Non-Manual Workers Group and the Semi and Unskilled Manual Workers Group.
- 5. **DEIS School Attendance:** You completed five years in a second level school that takes part in the Delivering Equality of Opportunity in Schools (DEIS) scheme run by the Department of Education and Skills.
- 6. **Area Profile:** You live in an area where there is concentrated disadvantage in other words an area where, for example, there is high unemployment and poverty and where only a small proportion of adults have attained third level education.

You must meet Indicator 1, the HEAR Income Limit, plus a correct combination of 2 other indicators to be eligible for HEAR. The combinations are:









Indicator 1, the HEAR Income Limit, is calculated by:

- How many children there are in your family;
- How many people in your family are in full time education;

Use the table to estimate if your family income is equal to or less than the HEAR income limit.

Number of dependent children* in your family	HEAR Income Limit
Fewer than 4	€45,790
4-7	€50,325
8 or more	€54,630

Add €4,670 to the total family/household income for every sibling/parent enrolled in a full time college, university or post leaving certificate course.

*A dependent includes:

- a sibling under the age of 16 years on 1 October 2020.
- a sibling over the age of 16 years on 1 October 2020 who is either:
 - attending post primary education.
 - attending a full time course in FET or higher education.
 - medically certified as permanently unfit for work.
- a parent attending a full time course in FET or higher education.

DARE is a third level alternative admissions scheme for school-leavers whose disabilities have had a negative impact on their second level education.

DARE offers reduced points places to school leavers who as a result of having a disability have experienced additional educational challenges in second level education.

You should apply to both DARE and HEAR if they are relevant to you.

Applicants who apply and are deemed eligible for both DARE and HEAR will be prioritised by the participating colleges and universities when offering their reduced points places.
